WHY IS UU MINISTRY FOR EARTH SO VITALLY IMPORTANT?

Dear Supporters,

In ways gentle and heart-rending, the last two years have transformed all of our lives. Time and again, we have realized just how interconnected we – and our many justice concerns – really are. We have been called to embody our Unitarian Universalist principles and commitments of interdependence and beloved community.

Through the ravages of a global pandemic and what seems like a never-ending stream of climate-induced chaos and the slow violence of environmental racism, Unitarian Universalist Ministry for Earth has continued providing space for education, accountable action and spiritual grounding.

Thanks to your support, UU Ministry for Earth sponsored and collaborated on a variety of educational opportunities and expanded our reach immensely. We invested in the documentary film The Condor and the Eagle, facilitated crossorganizational forums and dialogues, and hosted convenings to connect UUs activists to invite the community to engage with the 2021 UN climate conference.

UU Ministry for Earth deepened its commitment to accountable action and worked in partnership with Indigenous frontline communities on key campaigns in Minnesota and Washington, DC. We increased our investment in the UU Young Adult and UU BIPOC Climate Justice caucuses. And, we continued to use the voice and stature of UUMFE in the public witness arena, speaking out on a range of issues, within and beyond denominational walls.

UU Ministry for Earth offered more worship and wonder gatherings, including our first full-length virtual Earth Day service directly to congregations and individuals. We provided worshipful opportunities and resources, often in solidarity with frontline UU communities, on World Water Day, Earth Day, and Biodiversity Sunday, and at General Assembly. UUMFE Board and staff presence increased noticeably in congregations across the country through multiple guest preaching appearances.

Internal transformation is under way at UU Ministry for Earth, as well! After celebrating our 30th Anniversary in 2019, we began looking ahead to the next 30. We began an Appreciative Inquiry process to dream and discern our role as a joyful heartbeat for environmental justice within Unitarian Universalism. Determined to support front-line communities and constituent needs, the Board passed updated bylaws, welcomed a new Treasurer and Board members, and began the structural transition from a working board to a governing board. Further, we expanded our senior staffing, restructuring in a shared leadership model, and began investing in more ethical employment practices by moving contract and hourly positions to salaried staff positions.

None of these things would be possible without the support of foundations, congregations and individuals committed to our cause and faith. We are grateful for your support which helps UU Ministry for Earth continue to cultivate an ever-increasing variety of worship, workshops and accountable ministries.

We offer this look back, as we prepare to meet the program year ahead. Thank you for being part of the UU Ministry for Earth community and co-creating with us. Let us deepen our commitments to our shared Earth ministry and plant seeds for an engaged, connected, and healing UU Ministry for Earth for years to come.

2019 UUA GENERAL ASSEMBLY - UU MINISTRY FOR EARTH'S 30TH ANNIVERSARY! SPOKANE, OR

In response to a recent United Nations report that 1 million species are at risk of extinction within this century, and in the spirit of interdependence, UU Ministry for Earth put out a "call to arts" for UU congregations to make a piece of artwork representing and honoring a threatened or endangered species in their local area and bring it to the 2019 UUA General Assembly

for a Procession of the Species event.


UUMFE also partnered with the Washington-based Backbone Campaign to bring imagery for the procession, particularly uplifting and honoring the salmon and orcas of the Pacific Northwest.

This Spring, we renew the call for congregations to collaborate and "call to arts" to lead us into greater connection with Earth.

THE CONDOR AND THE EAGLE

Since 2019, UU Ministry for Earth has partnered with the creators of the award-winning documentary, The Condor & The Eagle, as an executive producer. UU Ministry for Earth hosted 25 community screenings in partnership with 35 congregations, 22 interfaith and community organizations, and 35 grassroots Indigenous & frontline community partners. These screenings raised over \$15,500 to support Indigenous-led Climate Justice efforts across Turtle Island.





Spring for Change: A Season of Sacred Activism "Pathways to Healing and Regeneration" - March 20-May 23, 2021

Spring for Change: A Season of Sacred Activism (Spring for Change), is an annual program of UU Ministry for Earth designed to inspire and resource UU community engagement in Earth-centered worship, education and action throughout the entire spring season. The 2021 Spring for Change season launched with a Spring Equinox Worship & Celebration and the Whole

Earth, Whole Church Congregational Climate Convergence, supporting the launch of Green Sanctuary 2030: Mobilizing for Climate Justice. Another highlight was the "Pathways to Healing and Regeneration" online Earth Day worship service that was streamed for national viewing and us ed for Earth Sunday worship services at more than 100 UU communities and congregations.
